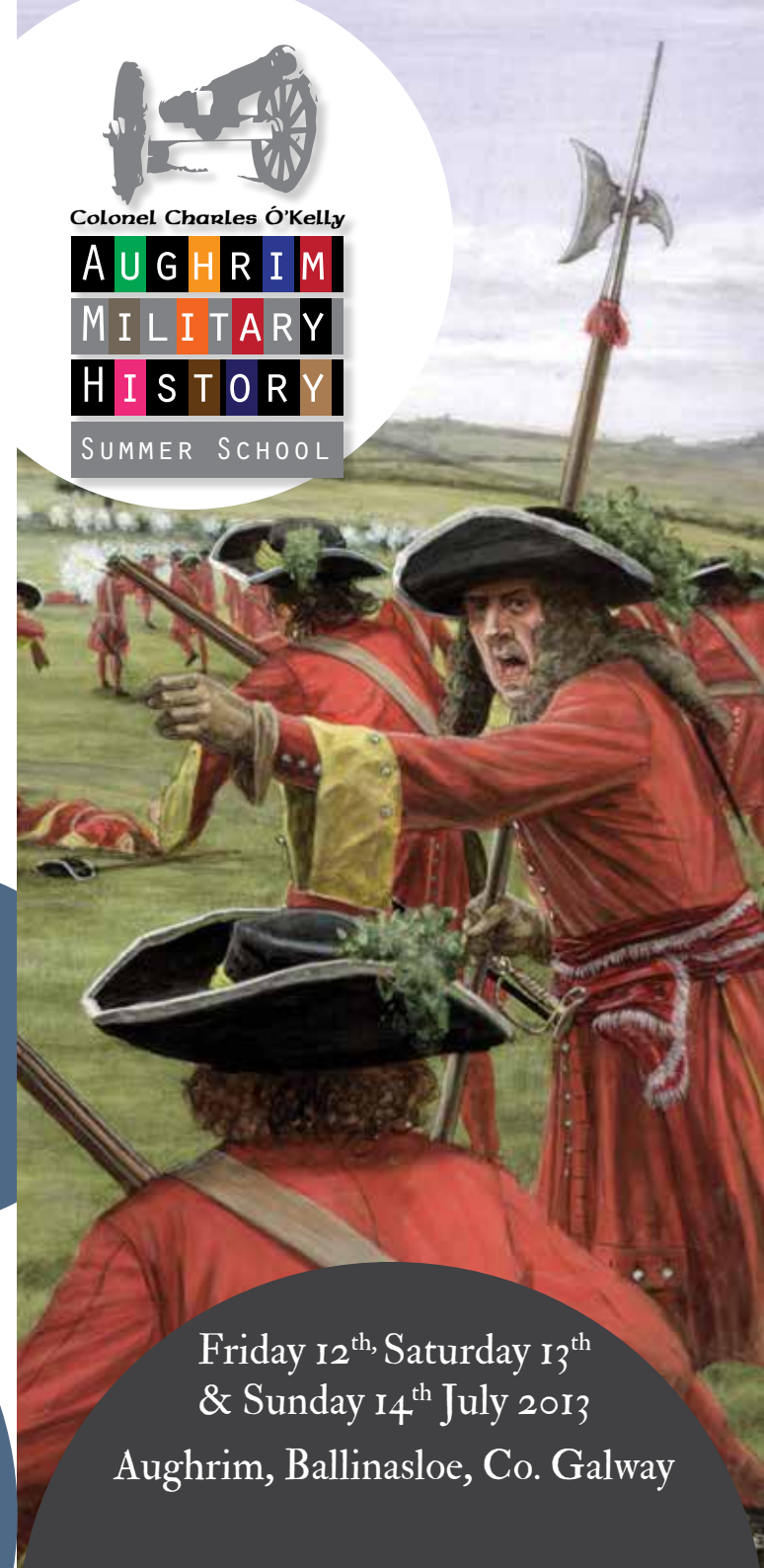

Cronin

Dr John Jeremiah Cronin has, amongst other things, contributed to the teaching of early-modern History in NUI Galway, University College Dublin, the City of Dublin VEC, and the Oscail programme in Dublin City University. Most pertinently for us, he has worked on the government sponsored “Irish Battlefields Project” and has overseen local History projects in County Galway, including a project based in Turloughmore, County Galway.

Dr Pádraig Lenihan lectures in history at the National University of Ireland, Galway. His main research interest lies in European military history from the Thirty Years War to the War of the Spanish Succession, with special emphasis on warfare in Ireland. His publications include 1690 *Battle of the Boyne*. Currently he is writing a biography of Richard Talbot Earl of Tyrconnell (d.1691) and co-editing an Irish Jacobite epic poem (over 5,000 lines) with Prof. Keith Sidwell.

Tomás
Ó Brógáin

Tomás Ó Brógáin and Oireas Historical Services are interested in the development and preservation of early modern Irish military heritage. As a published historian, with several publications to his credit including *The battle of the Swilly 1567* (History Ireland), he also works in close co-operation with Dutch, French, Spanish and Italian historical groups to build closer relationships in the context of the Irish diaspora post Treaty of Limerick in 1691 and its affect. Current projects

include, the development and promotion of Aughrim as a key European military heritage trail site. The Irish Brigades in the Service of James II in (Brittany 1691-1692 and Northern Italy 1693-1697). He is currently the cartographer for History Ireland but has also worked on *The Battle of Aughrim 1691* (McNally), *Flight of the Earl* (O’Ciardha), *The Battle of Benburb 1646* (Hollick) he is a research consultant for Monreagh education and cultural centre and has been involved with various authors in a consultancy capacity.

Dr Éamonn Ó Cíardha, is a Senior Lecturer in the School of English, History and Politics, University of Ulster. He has published and edited books and articles on Jacobitism, the Flight of the Earls, The Plantation of Ulster, law and order and the use of Irish language sources for seventeenth and eighteenth-century Irish History. His published works include *Ireland and the Jacobite Cause, 1685-1766. “A Fatal attachment”*. (Dublin, 2002)

Alan Smyth is a native of Dundalk, Co Louth, and has studied history at University College Dublin and the University of California, Los Angeles. He recently completed his PhD in history at Trinity College Dublin, where he examined the social and economic impact of the Williamite war on Ireland.

Professor
Keith
Sidwell

Keith Sidwell is Emeritus Professor of Latin and Greek, University College Cork and Adjunct Professor in the Department of Greek and

Roman Studies, University of Calgary. He has written widely on ancient Greek literature and its reception (e.g. Aristophanes the Democrat [Cambridge 2009]) and has been involved in several pedagogical projects concerning the ancient languages (J.A.C.T. ‘s (Reading Greek [Cambridge 1978], Reading Latin [Cambridge 1986 with Peter Jones], Reading Medieval Latin [Cambridge 1995]). For over a decade, since he established the Centre for Neo-Latin Studies at UCC, he has been involved in the resuscitation of interest in the early modern Latin literature of Ireland. His collaborative books in this area are *Making Ireland Roman*, with Jason Harris (Cork 2009) and *The Tipperary Hero: Dermot O’Meara’s Ormonius* [1615], with David Edwards (Turnhout 2011). He will be speaking about his current project, a collaboration with Padraig Lenihan to produce an edition of the so-called *Poema de Hibernia*, a complex account of the Williamite Wars of 1688-91, written in Latin hexameters in imitation of *Lucan’s Civil War* by an important official of James II’s government in Ireland.
